What our waste costs us in dollars

- \$6,164,000 2020/21 (actuals)
- \$6,978,000 2021/22 (actuals)
- \$7,271,000 2022/23 (actuals unaudited)
- \$8,450,770 2023/24 (adopted budget)
- \$8,664,780 2024/25 (estimate)
- \$8,882,347 2025/26 (estimate)

This is costs associated with contractors. Does not include other direct costs and overheads



With landfills servicing Greater Sydney likely to reach capacity by 2036, these are our goals

NATIONAL GOALS - National Waste Policy Action Plan (2019)

- Reduce total waste generated in Australia by 10% per person by 2030
- 80% average resource recovery rate from all waste streams following the waste hierarchy by 2030
- Significantly increase the use of recycled content by governments and industry
- Phase out problematic and unnecessary plastics by 2025
- Halve the amount of organic waste sent to landfill by 2030

Northern Sydney Regional Waste Strategy (2041)

- 1. Avoid and reduce waste
- 2. Recover resources
- 3. Protect the environment
- 4. Strategic collaboration
- 5. Education and engagement


NSW Waste and Sustainable Materials Strategy 2041

- A litter reduction target of 60% by 2030 and a plastic litter reduction target of 30% by 2025, as set out in the *NSW Plastics Action Plan*
- A goal to triple the plastics recycling rate by 2030, as set out in the NSW Plastics Action Plan
- A goal of net zero emissions from organic waste by 2030, as laid out in the NSW Net Zero Plan Stage 1: 2020–2030 (mandate for the councils to provide food and garden waste collections by 2030)
- Reduction in carbon emissions by 35% by 2030

LANE COVE LGA TARGETS

80% diversion rate for domestic waste by 2036

LGA waste stats 22/23 = diversion rate 47%



Waste breakdown 2022 - 2023

The diversion rate is a little lower than it expected this year as the Mechanical & Biological Treatment Facility (MBT) that processes a portion of our red bin at the Veolia Woodlawn facility was down for a number of months.


So on the surface the stats look bad for our red bin

Council Waste Initiatives

Subpods

- Trial with residents at Elena
 Apartments for 6 months
- Case study for unit blocks to use compost bins that don't require communal space





- Installation of 4 subpods along Longueville Road for surrounding restaurants to use to compost their food wastes
- Case study for the installation of systems in hubs across the LGA

Recyclesmart

• collected 16,527.23kg of material from Lane Cove residents in the last 12 months

Council Waste Initiatives

Community Recycling centre - Artarmon

• received 205,017kg of material in 2022/23.

Apartment Waste Improvement Program

- Bin audits, improved signage, personalised letters to residents, and support for initiatives such as composting.
- 7 buildings and over 900 units involved





- Offers discounted compost bins and worm farms to Lane Cove Residents alongside online tutorials and onboarding assistance
- First step in ongoing discussions with the community around the issue of food waste and the importance of avoiding food waste and diverting it from landfill.

Take-away Wastes - ReturnR

- Introduce reusable containers in Council staff kitchens to minimise the use of takeaway containers and normalise the acceptance of reusable containers within Lane Cove
- Engage with staff and local businesses on the benefits of re-use



Council waste Initiatives – the future

Planning for Food Organics

- Working with NSROC on a regional Organics Implications Study
- Objectives are to;
 - Develop a baseline model to compare the cost and emissions impacts of organic waste recovery pathways.
 - Determine the cost-effectiveness and emissions reduction potential for a range of resource recovery scenarios.
 - Develop a model that is easy for NSROC and councils to implement



Council waste Initiatives – the future

Food Waste - Bin Trim – reducing food and plastic waste from local businesses

Council received notification from the NSW EPA this quarter that despite a strong application, we were unsuccessful in securing funding under the Bin Trim Networks Program due to limits on the funding pool.

Feedback on the application was extremely positive, and the EPA will be including staff from the Waste Team to undertake the Bin Trim Assessor training so that we can implement some of the core components of the application and unlock future funding opportunities for participating businesses.

Investigation into Additional Services

- Investigate interest and feasibility of trialling e-waste and clothing collections from apartment complexes to increase recycling of these materials and reduce reliance on Recycle Smart service.
- Monitor developments around Soft Plastic Recycling




Sharewaste

Every 12 kg of organic material kept away from landfill prevents 1kg of methane. Equiv to driving 100km in a car, or charging your smartphone 3000 times




